Contracts in conjunction with Crittall included building front panels for the Anglo-Mexican Perfoleum Company, Rio de Janeiro (1928); Exeter Co-op (1936); HJ Gower and Co Ltd, London (1937); the Home Brewery Offices, Daybrook, Nottinghamshire (1939); Pyne Brothers Ltd, London (1935); Reserve Bank of India, Numbai (1938); Savings Bank of Glasgow, Ayr (1936); Unilever House, London (1931); Vintry House, London (1928); and several Montague Burton Ltd shops.; With the outbreak of the Second World War, the Lion dedicated production to airfield, dockyard, and civil defence castings. Over the course of the war many ornamental gates and railings were taken down, scrapped and sent back to the various foundries to be re-used.
