BALDERNOCK BALDERNOCK PARISH CHURCH

This rural late 18th century parish church is largely unaltered since its construction, though the vestry is a 19th century addition. The early 19th century watchhouse was used by those who were protecting the graveyard from grave robbers. The adjoining graveyard contains many interesting headstones. The church is set in a charming rural location close to Milngavie.

Learn about the history of the church and the watchhouse from church members. There is adequate on-street parking.

BEARSDEN

NEW KILPATRICK CHURCH

New Kilpatrick Parish Church was built in 1808 on the site of an earlier church of 1649. The original larger parish dates from the 13th century. Enjoy the very fine collection of stained-glass windows, including work by Stephen Adams and Alfred and Gordon Webster There will be stewards on site to answer any questions.

BISHOPBRIGGS

FORT THEATRE

This building was built in the 1700s as the barn for Brackenbrae Farm, In 1969 the Antonine Theatre Group acquired the building and converted it into the theatre known as "The Fort" today. Since then, they have organised hundreds of performances, community events, and private functions and hosted a variety of visiting groups from across Scotland.

Enjoy guided tours of the building and a chance to chat to members of the group about the history of the club and their activities today. Tea and coffee will be available. The Fort Theatre is an Autism Friendly Establishment (visual supports, ear defenders, fidget toys, social stories).














BISHOPBRIGGS LIBRARY Talk about Cawder **Estate**

Bishopbriggs Library is a former Victorian school building situated in the centre of Bishopbriggs. The building was fully refurbished as a library and community hub in 2018 and includes a multipurpose room and meeting spaces. The library has a Thomas Muir exhibition and local history section.

Enjoy a talk from Carol Primrose about the nearby Cawder Estate and its mansion Cawder House, noting the Roman remains. the early medieval history (both religious and political), the turbulent wars of independence and then the Jacobite uprisings, and the gracious living of the 19th and 20th centuries, marked by wars and golf. No booking required.

SPRINGFIELD CAMBRIDGE CHURCH

Springfield Church was first built in 1865. A modern sanctuary extension was added in the 1970s with additional halls, rooms and a small chapel. Come along for a guided tour of the church and audio-visual display. Information leaflets will be provided.

CADDER PARISH CHURCH

There has been a church on this site for over 900 years. The present building, built in the mid-nineteenth century, contains wonderful stained glass by artists including Alf Webster and Sadie McLellan. You will find a mort safe and watch hut to discourage graverobbers in the graveyard!

Come along and view the beautiful church sanctuary, stained glass windows and display. All welcome

A walk to the Foundry Collection Store

The Auld Kirk was built in 1644 as a replacement for the old parish church of St Ninian's at the Old Aisle. Burials around the Auld Kirk continued until the middle of the 19th century. The building and graveyard are Grade A listed and together form one of the finest and oldest sites in the town of Kirkintilloch. The museum housed within this building has a variety of objects primarily related to the social and industrial history of East Dunbartonshire, as well as a varied

programme of temporary exhibitions. Meeting at the Auld Kirk Museum, this walk will depart at 10.30am and take a circuitous route to our Foundry Collection store on Donaldson Crescent. The route will take in several examples of locally made ironwork on the way and participants will then have the chance to visit the collections store to see objects used at the foundries as well as photographs.

Tickets for this event will be listed on Eventbrite. Booking is essential due to limited numbers.

The Deafblind Scotland Learning and Development Centre was purpose built following a fundraising campaign led by deafblind people. The building is fully accessible for deafblind people and continues to be developed.

Book a guided tour of the building to learn about the facilities and the campaign to build the centre. There will be a chance to try out specialist equipment in the lending library, take a greenscreen selfie in the recording studio, use specialised printing equipment to create your name in tactile written language and walk around the tactile art exhibition led by the deafblind artist who produced the work. Do the guided tour of the tactile path while wearing simulation spectacles to understand the experience for people with different eye conditions.

The tours will be led by deafblind people and supported by specialist Guide Communicators. Tours must be prebooked and will run for 45 minutes at 10am, 12.30pm and 3.30pm. All aspects of the centre are focused on sensory equality with tactile aspects such as braille signage.

The last tour of the day will be BSL interpreted, including the animation showing.

ST MARY'S PARISH CHURCH

The striking pink sandstone neo-gothic church was built in 1914 to replace the old church which is now the Auld Kirk Museum. The building features excellent stained-glass windows and wood carvings designed by local artist Willie Rodger.

Come along for a guided tour and see banners detailing the history of the church from its earliest days. Feel free to wander around the building or take some time to sit and contemplate. Pamphlets detailing the history of the church and the stained-glass windows are available.




WILLIAM PATRICK LIBRARY

Display by Kirkintilloch and District Society of Antiquaries

The William Patrick Library opened at its current location in 1994 to replace the town library at Camphill House, Peel Park. It was refurbished in 2012. The stained-glass panels from Middlecroft House, the former home of Rita Cowan Taketsuru, the mother of Japanese Whisky, are housed inside. Visit Archives and Local Studies on the first floor of the library during its opening hours to discover more about your local history.

The Kirkintilloch and District Society of Antiquaries was founded in 1933 and is the local history society for Kirkintilloch. They hold meetings from October to April and organise outings to local sites of historical



OLD AISLE CEMETERY

Walk by the Kirkintilloch and District Society of Antiquaries

Join a guided walk around the graves and memorials in the Old Aisle Cemetery featured in the display by the Antiquaries in the William Patrick Library, including Beatrice Clugston, Tom Johnston and local poet David Gray. Meet opposite the belfry at the Old Aisle Road entrance at 2pm and finish by 4pm. No booking required. The walk will be partly on laid out paths and short grass, but also through longer grass in the old part of the cemetery. Please do not bring dogs, other than assistance dogs.

CLOBER FARM

Clober Farm is a fully accessible vacation accommodation with accessible garden, patio area and raised beds, designed with the wheelchair user in mind and open all year. Clober Farm apartment and grounds was bequeathed to Spinal Injuries Scotland in 2007 and, following extensive renovations, was officially opened by its Honorary President HRH Princess Royal in 2012. It is a self-catering apartment that can sleep up to six people, in three bedrooms. There is level access throughout and a combined kitchen/ living area with patio doors leading onto the garden. The home will be open to visitors to have a look around the facilities and garden. Come along to enjoy some refreshments and get to know the building.

LILLIE ART **GALLERY**

Guided tour of the **Gallery Store**

Lillie Art Gallery is a purpose-built gallery opened in 1962. It owes its existence to local banker and artist Robert Lillie (1867-1949). who left a substantial number of his own artworks as well as funds to build the gallery. Since 1962, this founding beguest of artworks has been developed to form a collection of Scottish art dating from the 1880s to the present day. Around 450 works are contained in the collection, which includes paintings, prints, drawings and a small collection of sculpture and ceramics.

Enjoy a peek behind the scenes in the store of the Lillie Art Gallery. The tour is at 2.30pm and will last approximately 30 minutes. Booking is essential, please phone the gallery to book on 0141 956 5536.

MILNGAVIE LIBRARY

GAVIN'S MILL

Gavin's Mill is one of the oldest buildings in Milngavie, dating from at least the 16th century. Powered by the Allander Water, it operated as a grain mill and latterly a sawmill until about 1960 when a fire gutted the interior. It was bought and reconstructed by architect Bert Morris and functioned as an office and restaurant until 2014. In 2017 the Gavin's Mill community project took it over and opened as a fair trade shop and café. Learn from volunteers about the history of the mill and the aim of the project to help develop sustainable communities at home and abroad between 2pm and 4pm.
